

















A Convergence of Solitudes AnitA anand 448 pages

Between an irresistible desire to belong to the bustling French Canadian society of the 1970s andd a heavy loyalty to her parents of Indian origin, Rani feels trapped. With all the intensity of youth, she escapes into the music of *Sensibilité*, a progressive rock band whose singer, Serge Giglio, is a leading figure in the Quebecois nationalist movement. Later, As an adult, she meets Mélanie, Serge's adopted daughter, who feels disconnected from Vietnam, her birth country that she doesn't remember. This new friendship will push them both towards an essential quest for their origins.

Built as a concept album whose songs take us from the partition of India to Operation Babylift at the end of the Vietnam War, from the first Quebec separation referendum of 1980 to the second one of 1995, *A Convergence of Solitudes* is a grandiose tale that is as historical as it is intimate.

Olivier Niquet



At twenty, I wanted to read all of Proust and to have ripped abs before dying young. Now I just want to lose twenty pounds before I finish my thesis on a research topic that no one cares about.



Olivier Lussier

Olivier Lussier grew up in Maricourt, Quebec, Canada. He is an engineer and a poet. He also organizes literary events in his hometown of Sherbrooke. He published his first collection of poetry, *Pour trouver l'beau*, in 2014 with Éditions *Fond'tonne* and his second book, *Cariacou*, in the fall of 2023 with Éditions de Ta Mère. In between, he made several zines, dozens of public readings and designed three or four machines of varying levels of complexity. At school you are "that girl ".

your history teacher, your math teacher, your english teacher, your music teacher, your friends, your crush, everyone is surprised that you are not dead. You do not know what to tell them.

At the age of twelve, Camille is diagnosed with a spinal cancer. She then enters the opaque and absurd medical world, harnessed to her parents who suffer with her, at an age when she should learn to distance herself from them. Rather than go to the mall like the other girls, she will helplessly watch as her body transform while literally hoping to survive puberty.

l'm An Arena Frédérique Marseille 176 pages

The life of an arena owner in the last winter of her twenties



To-do list for the start of the season:

-Ask my mother for her main door key to make duplicates -Check with Mrs. Elizabeth if she has found her 10mm

-Check with Mrs. Elizabeth if she has found her form wrench in the garage

-Look at least one late afternoon in the eye, without falling -Go to the city to buy bacon for spring break

-Rent a stroboscope for spaghetti night (check with parents that no one has epilepsy)

-Undo the nest that Robin made in my hands

-Ask the owner of the Gaïa-mazing retreats if I can store my heart in the basement

-Invite my father to visit the arena

An arena owner tries to get through the winter while putting herself back together, between practices for the skating show and the sound of the woodpeckers, while the reader holds its breath as if they were watching skaters doing triple axels and doubles toe loops on TV. I'm an arena is a book that should be read sitting on a cold bench in the bleachers of an ice rink while eating fries and gravy.



Camille Paré-Poirier

Camille Paré-Poirier is an actress, performer and author. Since graduating from the Cégep de Saint-Hyacinthe theater School in 2016, she has spent her time questioning the part of fiction in each of us.

In addition to acting and writing, she co-produces Pauline, an audio show that addresses the themes of dementia and ageism by questioning the meaning of grandmotherhood in Quebec. Say thank you is her first book.



Frédérique Marseille

Born in 1989 near Montreal, Frédérique Marseille has a complicated career path. One semester before completing her bachelor's degree in art history, she left academia to start her first startup, Art bang bang. In 2016, she left the city to start the Backbone climbing center as part of a family business. 
High Demolition is the story of Raph, a standup comedian in the making who just graduated from Comedy in Montreal. One evening, in a post-show party with other comedians, Raph meets Laurie, the book's narrator, a talented writer, who will tell him everything great that will happen to them and how he will destroy it all.

With this fourth novel, Jean-Philippe Baril Guérard continues his exploration of relations of power and competition. Through a narration that is just as inventive as in his previous books, he tells us about romantic failure, instant celebrity and self worth in the #metoo era.



Jean-Philippe Baril Guérard

Born in Plessisville in 1988, Jean-Philippe Baril Guérard was trained as an actor at the Saint-Hyacinthe Cegep Theater School, from which he graduated in 2009. Since then, he has been sharing his time between writing, acting and directing. He has written and directed several plays including *Tranche-cul* and *La singularité est proche*. He is currently writing his fifth novel.






A sharp and ironic look at a law faculty's poisoned environment

After losing her baby during her pregnancy, Dolores travels back to Moreau, the village of her childhood. In another house, Ms. Labelle is recovering from a broken leg, drinking tea in the middle of her Tiki decorated living room. Next door, eight-year-old Olivia walks in circles while her father works. Between two card games, old detective tv shows and the strange appearance of a bird with a broken wing, these three women will take care of each other and the forest all around the village will take care of them.

Like a children book for sad adults, *After Celeste* explores the paths of mourning, friendship, memory and, above all, healing.



Maude Nepveu-Villeneuve

Maude Nepveu-Villeneuve is a writer, publisher and teacher of literature. She published three novels at Éditions de Ta Mère. Her first children book, *Olivia wrapped in vines*, published in 2019, won the Prix des libraires. The english translation is published by Orca book.

A surreal coming-of-age story about women friendship

Chloé and Almée return home after running away for a few days and discover that there is nothing left in their tiny village. They climb on their bikes and decide to follow the railroad to the sea, where they can start their life as if nothing had happened, sailing in troubled waters between childhood and adulthood, where there is much more than salt water and shoals of fish.

Leaving From Scratch is an anti-coming-of-age novel, filled with great friendships and little betrayals. It's an adult novel that we would have liked to read as teenagers.




